

With 2020 declared as the World Health Organization (WHO) International Year of the Nurse and International Year of the Midwife, the profile of nurses and midwives is being recognised and celebrated. Making up well over half of the world's health workforce, nurses and midwives are vital for the achievement of Universal Health Coverage (UHC). We are thinking of you all at this challenging time for global health.

The important role of nurses and midwives was highlighted by Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, WHO Director-General, at the International Council of Nurses (ICN) 2019 Congress, who proposed "that every country bring one nurse and one midwife to the World Health Assembly" (WHA) 2020 and, in conjunction with ICN and Nursing Now, announced WHO is establishing a global annual recognition award for nurses and midwives.

To celebrate the 2020 Year of the Nurse and the Midwife (YONM), Women in Global Health (in partnership with the WHO, ICN, International Confederation of Midwives, United Nations Population Fund, and Nursing Now) calls for nominations of 100 outstanding midwives and nurses making a difference in global health. As we enter this difficult time with the COVID 19 pandemic, the valuable work nurses and midwives around the globe is highly visible and in our thoughts. The WHO Global Report on the State of the World Nursing (SoWN) has been developed to provide a technical description of the nursing workforce in member states and will provide welcome data on the global status of nurses. This report is due to be launched on the World Health Day, the 7th of April 2020.

WHO CC UTS has assisted with the collection of data in the Pacific region for this

report and are integral players in supporting nurses and midwives in education and their ongoing professional development. As part of this work, WHO CC UTS recently hosted Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officers (CNMOs) from 15 Pacific countries for a three day event collecting data for SoWN and to discuss common regional issues and key challenges facing nurses and midwives across the Pacific.

The WHO CC UTS forms part of an international collaborative network that assists and undertakes projects in support of the WHO's programs at national, regional and international levels, championing the roles of nurses and midwives around the world. The Inaugural Pacific Heads of Nursing Meeting 2020



The Inaugural Pacific Heads of Nursing Meeting (PHoN) was held on the 11-14th of February earlier this year in Nadi, Fiji. The PHoN was endorsed by the Heads of Health and announced by the Director General of the Pacific Community (SPC) in August 2019. The meeting's primary purpose is to provide executive level oversight for regional nursing functions in the Pacific, including a policy advisory and technical role to inform nursing decisions in the region.

The Pacific Community (SPC) co-organised the event with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT). Key partners included International College of Nurses (ICN), Australian College Operating Room Nurses (ACORN), Nursing Now, Royal Australian College of Surgeons Pacific Islands Program, UNAIDS, UNICEF, World Bank and WHO. Personnel from Australia, Fiji, French Polynesia, Nauru, New

Zealand, Palau, Solomon Islands, Tonga and Tuvalu were in attendance. For further information, read our article <u>here.</u>

Health Policy Workshop in New Zealand



The College of Nurses Aotearoa, New Zealand held a workshop at the Victoria University of Wellington which aimed to help attendees better their understanding and improve their methods of engagement with the health policy process in New Zealand (NZ).

Dr Mark Jones, the Incoming Chair of the College of Nurses Aotearoa Board started the workshop by asking "What do we mean by health policy?" The complexity of the role of NZ nurses in advocacy and health policy development was discussed to develop a foundation for subsequent suggestions and reccomnedations.

Following morning tea, Liz Manning of the College of Nurses Aotearoa introduced the Policy Skills Framework focusing on self-assessment. Attendees were asked to map their policy skills categorically in either Behavioural or Applied Skills.

Michele Rumsey (Director of WHOCC) then talked on the manner in which global policy is translated into local policy. Michele focused on integrating international and Pacific perspectives into the discussion.

The Deputy Chief Executive New Zealand Institute of Economic Research (NZIER), Todd Krieble suggested strategies in shaping health policy. Namely, by using systems thinking in relation to policy development, political and legislative processes, one could "differentiate from everyone else with an opinion."

The 2019 Global Symposium on Health Workforce Accreditation was held from the 10th to the 12th of December, in Istanbul, Turkey. The World Health Organisation (WHO), the Global Health Workforce Network (GHWN) and Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates (ECFMG) co-hosted the event. Representatives from national governments, intergovernmental organisations, health professional associations, health professional accreditation and regulatory bodies participated in discussion.

WHO support on updating the evidence on retention of health workers



Professor James Buchan, Adjunct Professor, has acted as lead consultant on a WHO project to develop country level case studies which reported and evaluated the implementation of policies intended to improve retention of health workers in remote and rural areas in South East Asia. Case studies were conducted in 2019 in six countries- Bhutan, India, Indonesia, Myanmar, Sri Lanka, and Thailand, and the key findings were synthesised into an overview report. Key preliminary findings were presented at the Prince Mahidol conference in Bangkok in January 2020.


