You'll apply theoretical knowledge in a range of clinical scenarios embedded in simulations, case studies and professional placements throughout your degree.

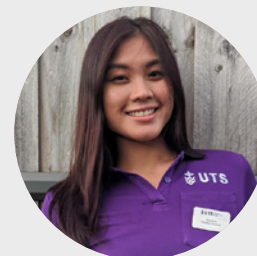
