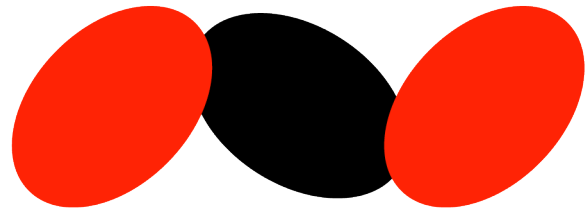

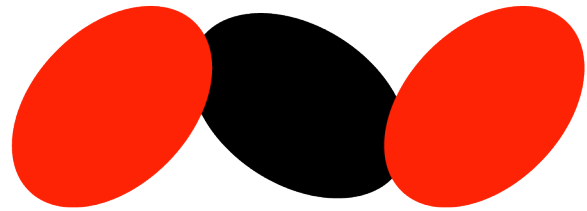

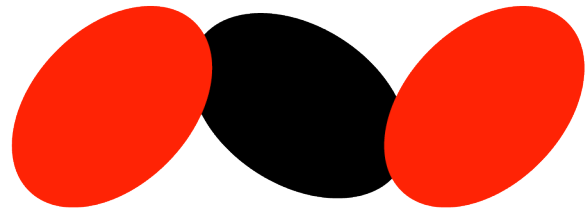


Seckin Ungur

Professor Robert Wood

Distinguished Professor and Director, UTS Futures Academy

Professor Bob Wood's research focuses on the social cognitive dynamics of human adaptivity in problem solving, personality and learning with applications in leadership, ethics, and diversity and inclusion.

He has developed, or co-developed, several research-based commercial products, including Active Memory, a brain training app marketed by the ABC, and Cognicity Academy, a set of online measurement and training programs. He was founder and director of the Accelerated Learning Laboratory (UNSW), the Centre for Ethical Leadership (UniMelb) and, currently, Cognicity Pty Ltd.

Professor Wood serves on several industry, government and not-for-profit advisory groups and boards.

Working closely with the UTS community, Michael has increased the profile of the library, strengthening new projects and expanding existing educational and support initiatives while leading the development of a new strategic plan.

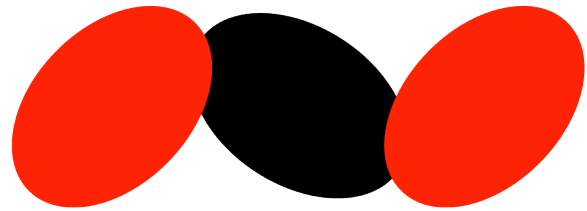


Ashley England

Associate Professor Natalie Lloyd

Academic Director (Learning and Teaching)

Natalie Lloyd is an Academic Director (Learning and Teaching) in UTS's Faculty of Engineering and Information Technology. Natalie's research is informed by her experiences as a woman in a non-traditional area: as an engineering executive, a chartered professional engineer and an Engineers Australia Fellow.

Natalie recently led a multidisciplinary research team exploring access, quality and wellbeing of equity status students in engineering work-integrated learning. Previous research includes the positive impacts of creating critical mass classrooms for women student engineers, challenges for equitable discourse in globalisation of engineering education and accreditation, and gendered perceptions of English language development in engineering education.
