1. Introduction

The UTS Centre for Social Justice & Inclusion is offering **2024 Social Impact Grants – Enabling change using SIF Dashboards**:

- Small grants of up to \$5,000, and
- Large grants of up to \$10,000.

The UTS Social Impact Framework (SIF) is our social justice roadmap, guiding us in our efforts to be a leading public purpose institution with social impact.

The UTS Social Impact Dashboards are a series of online, interactive dashboards that measure and report on our social impact.

The Centre for Social Justice & Inclusion is providing project grants for faculties and university staff (both academic and professional) to use the dashboards:

- to conduct research to improve our understanding of metrics reported in the dashboards
- to help to fill gaps in evaluation of the SIF by providing new data for the dashboards
- to enact social change within UTS, in response to some of the data reported in the dashboards.

2. What is the Social Impact Framework?

At UTS, social justice is core to our DNA. We are committed to driving social change. This commitment is reflected in our diverse institution-wide social justice initiatives.

To formalise our social justice agenda, and map out our future work in this space, we created the UTS <u>Social Impact Framework</u> (SIF).

Through the SIF, UTS will:

- · contribute to a healthy, sustainable, and socially just society
- contribute to increased public good, social mobility and equity
- support the creation of enabling environments for communities to thrive
- positively influence and impact the public, individual, and systemic forces that shape justice.

These are ambitious goals, but they reflect our belief in the power of universities to contribute to public good.



3. Social Impact Dashboards

The UTS <u>Social Impact Dashboards</u> are nine online, interactive Power BI dashboards that measure and report on our social impact. The dashboards collate and bring together data relating to the social impact and public good contribution of the university, and the enabling factors that support these. The dashboards are accessible to all UTS staff and stakeholders and allow the filtering of data by faculty, unit, and an array of demographic data. This enables contextually relevant interrogation of the data to inform planning at the faculty and division level.

Importantly, it means we are transparent and accountable in the social impact goals we set for ourselves. Three times a year, findings from the dashboards are reported to the Vice-Chancellor's Social Justice and Inclusion Committee (VCSJIC). The VCSJIC was established to monitor and track the university's performance in achieving its social justice objectives, including those outlined by the Social Impact Framework. The committee is chaired by the Provost and is made up of the Pro Vice-Chancellor (Social Justice and Inclusion) and executives from Faculties and Divisions.

Social Impact Grants – Enabling change using SIF Dashboards

The **Social Impact Grants – Enabling change using SIF Dashboards** are for UTS internal projects, designed to support faculties and university staff to engage with and use the dashboards:

- to conduct research to improve our understanding of metrics reported in the dashboards
- to fill gaps in evaluation of the SIF by providing new data for the dashboards
- to enact social change within UTS, in response to some of the data reported in the dashboards.

5. Workshops

Workshops will be held for UTS staff to explain and demonstrate the dashboards, and to provide more information on the grants and to help interested participants in designing projects for grant applications.

The workshops will be held on the following dates:

These sessions are open to all faculties and portfolio staff. Those considering applying for a grant are strongly encouraged to attend as the objective of the grants is to use the dashboard data as a springboard for further research or intervention.

6. Application process

6.1 When do applications open?

Applications open on Monday 12 February 2024.

6.2 When do applications close?

Applications close COB Friday 12 April 2024.

6.3 Funding

Each grant recipient will be awarded:

- up to \$5,000 for small projects, and
- up to \$10,000 for large projects or collaborative projects.

Faculties (and portfolios) can collaborate and pool funds for a project.

Funding will be transferred to the staff member's faculty or unit for disbursement. As part of the application process, all applications will need to include an indication of how the grant will be spent.

The grant can be used flexibly to fund an entire project, or for aspects of the initiative. For example, it could be used in the research, data evaluation, concept, pilot, or implementation phase. It could be used as a catalyst to progress a current project or for a new idea or project.

6.4 Summary of key dates

• Faculty workshops: 28 and 29 February and 4 and 6 March 2024

Applications open: 12 February 2024

Applications close: 12 April 2024

Successful applicants notified: 8 May 2024

Funds expended and acquitted: 6 December 2024



- Post-grant workshop for all grant recipients to share findings and lessons in week commencing 4 November 2024
- Final report due: 13 January 2025.

6.5 Application Criteria

6.5.1 Eligibility

UTS staff members, both academic or professional staff (permanent, sessional, or casual) or students based in a faculty, who has expertise or an interest in socially impactful work are eligible to apply.

As a condition of the grant, students must identify an academic or professional staff supervisor for their project. Funds will be allocated to the staff member(s) who will take responsibility for the financial acquittal of the grant.

Group applications and cross-faculty or portfolio projects are welcome.

6.5.1 Suitability of Project

To be deemed a suitable project for funding, the project or initiative:

- i. must be aligned to the Social Impact Framework and Dashboards.
- ii. aims and outcomes must be linked to one or more SIF domains / pre-conditions and must specify which dataset or measure is being addressed:
 - 1. Domain 1: Student equity
 - 2. Domain 2: Student agency
 - 3. Domain 3: Maximising our impact
 - 4. Domain 4: Contributing to community
 - 5. Domain 5: Advocacy and thought leadership
 - 6. Domain 6: Business operations
 - 7. Precondition 1: Leadership and culture
 - 8. Precondition 2: Partnerships
 - 9. Precondition 3: Social capital and trust
- iii. must fall under one of the following categories:
 - to conduct research to improve our understanding of metrics reported in the dashboards
 - to fill gaps in evaluation of the SIF by providing new data for the dashboards
 - to enact social change within UTS, in response to some of the data reported in the dashboards.

6.5.1 Project types

The grant funding can be used to fund UTS internal projects and initiatives:

- i. research projects
- ii. teaching and learning projects
- iii. initiatives and events that build the culture of inclusion and social justice at UTS
- iv. other projects that further the purpose and vision of the Social Impact Framework.

6.6 Are there any conditions for the grant?

Funds will be allocated in a single payment after 8 May 2024.

Funds must be financially acquitted by 6 December 2024. Funding cannot be rolled over to 2025.

Projects need to be near completion by mid-December. A final report must be submitted by **13 January 2025**.

Successful applicants will be required to attend a post-grant evaluations workshop – to share findings and lessons in the **week of 4 November 2024**.

The outcomes and successes of the awarded grants will be shared through UTS and the broader community in Social Impact Dashboard case studies.

6.7 How do I apply?

Applications must be submitted online through the <u>Social Impact Grants – Enabling change using SIF Dashboard form.</u>

6.8 When will successful applicants be notified?

Successful applicants will be notified by 8 May 2024.

6.9 How will the applications be assessed?

7 Grant applications will be assessed according to the following criteria:

Project aligns with the purpose and vision of the Social Impact Dashboards.

Project will contribute to or respond to one or more domains / pre-conditions and clearly specifies which dataset or measure is being addressed in the <u>Social Impact Dashboards</u>.

Project must fall under one of the following categories:

- (a) to help to improve our understanding of the metrics reported in the dashboards;
- (b) to help fill gaps in evaluation of the SIF by providing new data for the dashboards;
- (c) to enact social change within UTS, in response to some of the data reported in the dashboards.

Project aims and outcomes to the UTS community are clear and linked to one or more SIF domain(s) / pre-condition(s). Project outcomes are achievable within the timeframe and resources.

Project activities and intended use of funding are detailed, clear and achievable within the project scope.



Potential risks and mitigation is clearly articulated.

Project is endorsed by the Faculty Dean/Unit Director/Supervisor.
