





Regional Quality Improvement Project (RQIP)

Brief 2: September – November 2023

Project update

To date 13 out of 14 countries have agreed to participate in the Regional Quality Improvement Project (RQIP). Data collection has commenced with initial meetings held with Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officers in 12 out of 14 countries. The next stage of data collection has occurred in 12 out of 14 countries and additional meetings have been held with key stakeholders including members of nursing councils, accrediting and regulatory bodies, as well as higher education institutions delivering nursing programs. Data collection has been completed in 3 out of 14 countries.
