Professional recognition

Our undergraduate psychology courses are accredited by the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) with conditions and are classified as a professional pathway by the Department of Education.

How do I become a psychologist?

Psychologists must be registered nationally with the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency via the Psychology Board of Australia.

Step 1: A 3-year APAC-accredited undergraduate degree (e.g. UTS Bachelor of Psychology) or bridging program.

Step 2: An APAC-accredited 4th year (e.g. UTS Bachelor of Psychological Science (Honours)).

Note: the 4-year UTS Bachelor of Psychology (Honours) covers Steps 1 and 2.

Step 3: An APAC-accredited 2-year master's (with one or more areas of practice endorsement; e.g. UTS Master of Clinical Psychology) or 5th year plus 1 year of supervised practice + pass the national exam.

Note: eligibility to progress to each subsequent step does not guarantee admission.
