
A postgraduate public health degree is not just about taking an intellectual leap – it prepares you for a huge step forward in your health career.

At UTS you can study public health mixed (online and on-campus) or fully online. Our public health courses are open to both non-medical and medically-qualified students seeking a career in public or global health, research or practice. You will develop skills in planning, implementation and evaluation of public health programs in a wide range of areas, such as infectious diseases, reproductive and sexual health and Indigenous health. We will prepare you to drive real change and give you the skills and expertise you need to prepare for leadership roles in this field.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Applicants must have completed a UTS recognised bachelor's degree, or an equivalent or higher qualification, or submitted other evidence of general and professional qualifications that demonstrates potential to pursue graduate studies. This evidence may include extensive relevant work experience in a healthcare or human services field. Applicants who do not have an undergraduate degree, but who have extensive relevant work experience in a healthcare or human services field and can demonstrate the capacity to undertake tertiary study may also be considered eligible.

SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS

CV (applicants who do not have an undergraduate degree or equivalent); Academic transcripts (may be required).
